

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

Awards

Best Apprenticeship / Graduate Award

The University's Modern Apprenticeship scheme won at the s1jobs Recruitment Awards. The Centre for Research Collections has employed 2 Modern Apprentices under the Customer Service Framework. The University was praised for the thought and planning that had been put into the scheme.

Innovative Use of Technology Award



Our work to embed Wikipedia skills in the curriculum has been recognised by the Herald Higher Education Awards for

Innovative Use of Technology. The nomination focused on the unique offer the University of Edinburgh makes in helping develop digital literacy skills through our partnership with Wikimedia UK.

Ewan McAndrew, Wikimedian in Residence at the University, was also shortlisted for LILAC's Information Literacy Award 2019, which recognises an outstanding UK-based researcher, practitioner or academic working in the field of information literacy.

Blackboard Catalyst Award



The VLE migration project was awarded the prestigious Blackboard Catalyst Award, which saw

thousands of pages and over 30 courses from the Law School migrated into the institutional VLE, Blackboard Learn. This was a 3-year long piece of work and highlights what can be achieved when central services work together with schools to support and implement technical and pedagogical innovation.

Learning Technology Team of the Year Award finalists

The programme team delivering the institution-wide lecture recording service, Media Hopper Replay, have been selected as Finalists for the Association for Learning Technology (ALT) Learning Technology Team of the Year Award. Getting our students connected to the University of Edinburgh

The University hosts start of term events for new students joining in September and January. In September, we welcome more than 12,000 new students from the UK and around the world. We also welcome 1,000 new students to our online courses each year.

When new students join the University, we are responsible for making sure that our services are easily found, inclusive and accessible to all. Before they arrive, students are able to connect to their email, log in to the MyEd student portal and register for eduroam WiFi.

Once they are here, students:

- **collect their cards:** This card serves as the official student ID, granting access to borrow books from the library, enter buildings and take advantage of student discounts.
- access their timetable: Setting up Office 365 on mobile devices gives easy access to course timetables.
- explore the Library: The Library offers access to books, journals, e-journals and printing facilities. Students can find, renew and request books with DiscoverEd.
- find learning materials: Learn is the primary Virtual Learning Environment at the University, granting access to materials, assignments, grades and feedback for more than 5,000 courses.
- find out how to stay safe online: Our Information Security team help make sure students' work and files are protected from viruses, phishing and malware.

Teams of student helpers will be available in the Main Library to help students get connected to University systems, answer any IT-related queries and provide support and guidance in finding their way around the Library.

Improving the student registration process

Students and staff across the University are collaborating to deliver an improved online registration process for new entrants and introduce a new online registration process for all returning students.

At a focus group held earlier this year, we tested the existing process with students, and they provided additional comments as to how they would like to see the process improved. We are using this feedback to influence the new design of the process.

In addition, working with EUSA VP Georgie Harris and the Lothian Joint Electoral Board, we are looking to introduce electoral voter registration to support students' involvement in local and national elections.

Wireless collaboration for learning and teaching

Following a successful pilot project, a wireless collaboration platform has now been installed in 150 teaching spaces across 4 sites at the University. The platform enables staff and students to connect wirelessly for learning and teaching, regardless of which device or operating system they choose to use.

Wireless content sharing in lecture theatres, teaching spaces and meeting rooms has been available for several years, but users often experienced connectivity issues.

Following extensive evaluation of new suppliers of wireless collaboration solutions, Mersive Solstice was installed on a pilot basis in a few teaching and meeting spaces. Feedback was extremely positive with users reporting it was easy to use and intuitive for Android, Apple, Windows and Linux users alike.

Mersive Solstice is a very flexible technology that allows teachers and students to interact much more easily and democratically. We are already making extensive use of new Solstice features as they are added. Solstice Ink, allowing users to highlight areas on the display using their mobile device, is a powerful and effective innovation, for example. Using the digital signage feature associated with the Office 365 calendar facility, we can display room booking information in each room when the display isn't being used for teaching.

Data centre power resilience and energy reduction

To help meet the University's sustainability goals, the IT Infrastructure team recently completed a project to cut power consumption. Working with the University Estates group, the team delivered improved power resilience at the University's data centre in King's Buildings. New dual power supply circuits were installed to ensure that electrical supply to the data centre will be maintained in the event of a component failure in one of the supply circuits. To reduce temperatures and increase power efficiency, cold aisle partitioning and entry doors were installed around the rows of server racks in both data centres. Overall, the approach reduces temperatures in the data centres and reduces energy usage.

New Notifications Service

The new Notifications Service will make it easier for you to keep track of important information and tasks by giving you a single location to check for such notifications.

We have been trialling the service during the last few months, and you may already have received notifications in MyEd for course enhancement questionnaires. Over the coming months we're extending the service to include more notifications, such as key tasks for new students, exam times and alerts for outstanding fees and accommodation payments.

PebblePad access beyond graduation

PebblePad, the University's digital portfolio platform, is available to students even after graduating. Students can choose to retain full access to their marked assignments, reflective blogs, portfolios,

workbooks and continue to use PebblePad to support their personal learning and professional development as they move on to the next stage of their career. Signing up for the free alumni account is very simple and only requires a personal email address. The offer is also available to staff members who are PebblePad users but are about to leave the University.

When you want to read deeper than the course resource list and go beyond a Google search, Library Subject Guides can help out. A Library Subject Guide is a digital 'room' for subject-specific library materials. Content is curated by an Academic Support Librarian who understands that subject. There are currently over 65 Subject Guides, which include learning materials on literature searching and referencing, as well as guides to Library print and digital content.

Working together to improve our Virtual Learning Environment

As a student at Edinburgh, you can find course specific materials on the Learn Virtual Learning Environment (VLE). As part of our ongoing commitment to improving students' digital experiences, Learn is undergoing a makeover to ensure it is easier for both students and staff to use, courses are more accessible and inclusive and the terminology used is more consistent.

The University's award-winning Learn project team are driving these improvements through a project called Learn Foundations, which aims to take advantage of new technologies and embed good practices to improve the student experience.

To help us to implement these improvements, a team of students have been working with us to support the first schools adopting the new framework for the start of teaching in Semester 1. The aim is for all courses in Learn to adopt this over the next three years.

Students and staff have been involved in a co-design process to help us understand what is important when using Learn and what support we can provide to improve the experience. The experiences of users are at the heart of our improvement work, and these insights have been invaluable in helping us to validate that the new structure is reflective of our users' needs.

In addition, Learn is moving to a cloud hosting service, giving us access to new functionality and improving overall service availability.

Usability testing

helping us understand student experiences in Learn

The User Experience Service has carried out a comprehensive programme of user research in support of the Learn Foundations project. As part of this, we have conducted regular usability testing sessions and playbacks to help uncover what's working well, and not so well, for our students using different Learn course environments.

Each session has brought together staff from across the University to watch students using Learn. Across 7 showcase sessions, we have played back 23 usability tests and collaboratively identified and prioritised 74 usability issues. This is driving improvements to Learn course environments.





Digital skills courses for students

The Digital Skills and Training team provide free face-to-face and online training opportunities across a range of different topics. Each student has a unique journey at Edinburgh and may wish to access training courses at different points throughout their academic life, which is why we now have many courses open to students at any stage of their degree. We have courses on subjects such as: Adobe Spark, Excel, Microsoft Office 365, mobile film making (DIY Film School), creating Gifs (Gif It Up), Wikipedia, Library Bitesize sessions, Information Security sessions, reference managers, Photoshop CC, LaTeX and Word.

Being proficient in certain software/topics can assist in making academic life a little easier and will build students' digital skills for the future.

Upskill with a free short online course

Free short online courses (also known as Massive Open Online Courses, or MOOCs) can be a great way to supplement your learning. Career advancement, improving workplace performance and preparing for interviews are some of the top reasons current students take MOOCs. Ludovico, a Ugandan doctor and online student on the Master of Public Health degree, took specialist MOOCs to help him in his clinical role. Obinna, a final year PhD student in Engineering, used MOOCs to upskill his software knowledge in preparation for future jobs.

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New research data management course

The Digital Curation Centre, in collaboration with Research Data Netherlands, have developed a new MOOC on Delivering Research Data Management Services. The course is launching on 2 September and is aimed at audiences that support researchers in managing and sharing their data, including librarians, information specialists, data stewards and research office staff. The course will help develop the confidence of research support managers in designing, developing and reviewing institutional RDM services, and will provide an understanding of the complexities of setting up a new service with use cases from around the world and interactive models.

Special circumstances and coursework extensions

We're currently engaging with students to create a simple, one-stop way of applying for special circumstances and coursework extensions across all courses.

This service will allow students to make a single notification to the University of a situation they are in. They will then be able to apply for the assessment support they need across all their courses. It will replace multiple different processes at each school, save students from having to submit duplicate applications and hopefully produce more consistent and fair decisions.

Student-led subtitling pilot project

Students are at the heart of moves to improve the accessibility of our online materials. A team of students trialled a student-led transcription service earlier in the year as part of a pilot project to provide a subtitling service for public-facing content.

The pilot is now being evaluated and initial feedback from content owners has been overwhelmingly positive. Students who took part in the pilot appreciated the flexibility of the work and ability to plan it around their studies; they also enjoyed shaping a potential new service. The pilot will inform future options.

Postgraduate application form accessibility improvements

As part of the University's commitment to ensuring that its websites are accessible to all, we have updated the postgraduate application form to make it easier for everyone to read and use.

The entire form can now be completed without using a mouse, and the red and green progress indicators have been replaced with icons

Warning messages are now presented more clearly for those using screen-reading technology, and we have increased the contrast and font size on the form.

There are also more shortcuts and improved navigation via the TAB button for keyboard users.



Tools to help write a better thesis or dissertation

The Research Data Service has created a new 'Making the Most of your Dissertation' handbook. It is specifically tailored for undergraduate students starting to prepare their dissertation projects. The handbook takes you through all the stages of your dissertation journey: from choosing your question, to dealing with literature and data, to writing up, to preserving your data after submission. Unlike existing material for postgraduates and researchers, this handbook has been written by one of our PhD interns from the perspective of a student. It places data management tips within the broader experience of conducting an undergraduate dissertation.

Also, for students using Microsoft Word to write their thesis or dissertation, check out our 'Producing a thesis or dissertation using Word' classroom courses and online self-enrol course. The Framework encourages course


organisers to use Resource Lists to

Through this scheme, we have recruited the world's first Wikidata intern to be our 'Witchfinder General'. Emma Caroll, a 4th year Geology and Physical Geography student, will explore how to surface data from the Survey of Scottish Witchcraft Database (1563-1736) as linked open data in Wikidata and find engaging ways to tell the stories of this little understood period of history through the form of digital maps and timelines.

Transgender:

Intersectional/ International Conference

Two PhD researchers who have worked within ISG, Gina Maya Roberts and Dominique Green, recently hosted an international conference at the University titled Transgender: Intersectional/International. Partnering with academics and activists from across Scotland, the conference was organized as a space to hear transgender narratives, particularly focused on intersections of structural inequalities in Scotland and around the world.

The conference's objectives related to aspects of the students' personal and professional experiences and interests. Gina, who is transgender, recognised in her research the lack of diverse voices and sought to create a space in which minority transgender individuals could voice their own stories. Dominique's research draws on intersectionality to understand how and why structural disadvantages exist and persist. With their diverse backgrounds, the conference aimed to address structural inequalities in terms of speaker representation and resourcing of speakers.

Digital copies of library resources

The E-Reserve team supports students by producing copyright compliant digital scans of essential articles and chapters that can be provided to students and included in Resource Lists. **edin.ac/resource-lists**

The team also works with the Student Disability Service to provide accessible copies of library resources.



High Use Books

The High Use Books (HUB) team manages access to essential print resources, ensuring that items identified by Course Organisers are made available to students in reserve collections, providing multiple copies, where required, to meet student need. The team ensures library systems are up to date, allowing students to search for essential books on DiscoverEd or through Resource Lists.



Shelving print resources

The Main Library shelving team is vital in ensuring students can locate the print resources they need, both by shelving items quickly and accurately, and by being available on each floor to support and guide students who may need help to locate specific items.



Items on demand

The University Collections Facility team provide an on-demand service for items located at the off-site store, sending physical items out to the Main Library and site libraries and providing scans of chapters or journal articles direct to users. **edin.ac/university-collections-facility**
